Investigation Examples




Types of allegations that we typically investigate:

- Misreporting and/or failure to report production or make royalty payments
- Non-Compliance with contract requirements resulting in loss of income due to lower sales prices
- Intentional alteration of gas meters to reduce reportable production volumes



Investigation Examples

- Marketable condition improper deduction of transportation and processing costs
- > Non-arms length sales transactions
- Horizontally drilling into and producing from Federal or Indian land without a lease
- Falsification of safety or environmental tests
- Failure to report and cover up an oil spill
- > Theft of product










Proactive Responsible Truthful






Get out in front of it and show you're responsible
